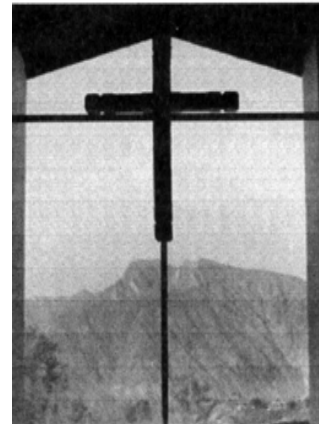

Reflections from the Desert

Responding to Evil with Love

If you knew you had 24 hours to live, what would you do? Once Jesus realized that the Jewish civil and religious authorities had decided to have him killed, he prepared himself by prayer, teaching and forgiveness. For us the disciples of Jesus, the end of his life teaches us a unique lesson of how Jesus responded to evil with love.

Holy Thursday: Serve One Another As I Have Served You

It was Passover. Jesus gathered with his disciples and the women to celebrate God's liberating the Jews from slavery in Egypt by eating the ritual Paschal meal. But that night, his last, Jesus opened his heart

fully to those who were present. He did two things which were not in the prayer book. First, by assuming the role of a slave who washed the feet of guests when they arrived for dinner, Jesus taught us that no service, no act of loving kindness, is below the dignity of his followers. Secondly, in the form of bread and wine, He gave himself to those who were there and commanded that we too do this in memory of Him. What followed was betrayal by one of the 12 for 30 pieces of silver. Jesus was then arrested, denied and beaten by night.

Good Friday: Greater Love Than This No One Has But To Give One's Life For One's Friends



In the early morning, there was a mock Jewish religious court followed by accusations before Pilate. During the occupation, the Romans had reserved capital punishment for themselves so the Jews had to take Jesus to Pilate. Even though he found no case against Jesus, Pilate had him whipped and out of fear of the crowds had Jesus crucified. He died and was buried.

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Spring Gardening and the Joy of Lent



When Alex and I lived in Bend, Oregon, one of our ministries was to drive to Lakeview once a month (some 170+ miles one way), to help “close down that parish.” But the other three Sundays a month we were at Trinity parish in downtown Bend. We keep in touch with the parish by way of their monthly newsletter, and our former Rector, Bill Ellis, had some interesting thoughts about “Spring, Gardening and Lent” in the latest newsletter and I thought they were worth sharing. And our outgoing People’s Warden spoke of having a “Joyful Lent” in our last newsletter and I think the two thoughts go well together. See what you think.

Bill noted that he’d never been able to equate the seasons of the year to the seasons of the Church; especially Spring, when it is used as a metaphor for resurrection. For Bill+, it is more a theological point, rather than the fact that he’s not all that close to nature, and here is where he got interesting...and I got interested! “Spring is the re-creation of the same life as we experienced before. The tree, shrub, the bush, doesn’t die, but rather goes dormant for a while, and then when the conditions are right produces the exact same sort of life as it did before. Resurrection, on the other hand, is the creation of brand new life, something qualitatively different than what came before even if we can see that it has some continuity with what came before.”

So, for Bill+, spring is a great metaphor for Lent. And I think there is something in what he points out. For instance, if you’ve ever had a garden, you know that prior to the “bloom,” and regardless of

the weather conditions, a healthy and productive garden doesn’t just happen, it requires a lot of work. You know the drill: prepare soil, fertilize it, etc. Then you plant the seeds or bushes which require not just water, but protection from weeds, bugs, birds, wind, and so-on. Now, for some folks, working in the garden is an end in itself, but for others it is the hope of producing something beautiful or tasty. That is Lent!

The parallel then, between the spring garden and Lent, is that both call for preparation. We work ourselves up to the point where we can be receptive to the kind of growth that we are all capable of producing. Oh, sure it may mean that we dig up ground we’ve dug up many times before, and like in the garden we get a bit messy and dirty from the effort.

If we are looking for growth, if we want change, then like any gardener in the spring, we do the required work. I agree with Bill, when he says, “spring is a wonderful metaphor for Lent. It reminds us that we really can grow; it points us to the truth that Lent is a moment of the truest and most important sort of optimism and hope and it shows us that the real reason for seasons of penitence is not so that we remind ourselves of what we have done wrong, but so that we can prepare to become new people living new lives.”

So, not only are spring and Lent a great match...but both can bring Joy. May yours be a Joyful Lent.

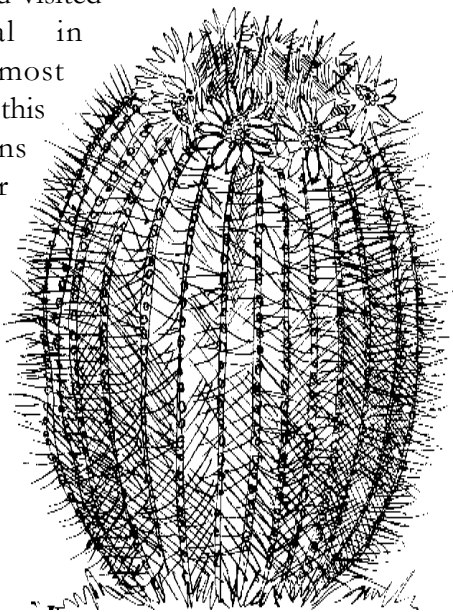
Easter Flowers

Holy Saturday Vigil: Eternal Vindication

His followers were devastated. They went home in utter despair. The one they loved had been murdered. Since His body was not properly prepared for burial, the women rose at sunrise to perform the ritual anointing. They were shocked to find the stone rolled away and the body missing. Jesus appeared to Mary Magdalene and told her to tell the others. That evening He appeared to them and said: "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

What we remember and celebrate in the liturgy of Thursday, Friday and Saturday night is the conclusion of the human life of Jesus. Out of love, Jesus chooses to remain with us and we have communion with Him every time we eat the Bread and drink the Wine in memory of Him. He showed His love for all humanity by His willingness to forgive the sins of everyone. God vindicated Him by not letting death have the last word but rather by granting eternal life. Through baptism we begin our spiritual journey and in death we enter into the fullness of life.

Come, celebrate with us these three holiest days. Our traditional Easter Sunrise service will be on the hill behind the Methodist church. Right after its conclusion, come to St. Barnabas for Holy Communion. There will also be a festive service at 9:30am.

In response to God's unconditional love and promise of everlasting life, our cry is Alleluia! Hebrew for "Praise God!"
